The program will feature three exciting and inspiring speakers who will present on matters of broad interest, both scholarly and curricular.

Charlaine Lunsford, of Great Bridge High, Chesapeake, VA, will talk to us about "Exciting Changes to the AP Latin Exam." Charlaine taught at Woodrow Wilson/Manor High School for 24 years and will be teaching at Great Bridge High in Chesapeake this year. You will recognize her as a member of CAV off and on for 20 years who has served as a member-at-large and website editor. She has served on numerous committees and local organizations, attended conferences all over the region, and received two teaching awards, including the 2020 Society for Classical Studies (SCS) Award for Excellence in Teaching at the Precollegiate Level. Charlaine also worked on the new AP Latin curriculum with the AP College Board. In her spare time, she reads, learns new things, travels, spends time with friends and family, and rides her motorcycle. Her favorite adventure was spending 6 weeks in Rome last summer, 5 with the American Academy in Rome and one with her amazing husband.

Caleb Dance, Associate Professor at Washington & Lee University, will share with us much that he has learned in his research on Ovid in a presentation entitled, "Annotated Amores: Book History in Ovid's Elegies." Caleb earned his B.A. from Tulane University and his M.A., M.Phil., and Ph.D. from Columbia University before joining the W&L faculty in 2014. Caleb cultivates broad interests in ancient Greek and Roman literature, teaching courses on ancient languages, sex and gender in the Greco-Roman literature, canon formation, and literary genre. His publications treat laughter, humor, and comic theory in the works of Homer, Ovid, and Lucian. His newest project draws upon a collection of love poetry by Ovid—the Amores—to explore how this work survived to the present and how the wax tablets and papyrus rolls on which ancient literature was composed and circulated may have shaped readers' experiences of it.

**Nadhira Hill,** Assistant Professor of Classical Studies and Archaeology at Randolph-Macon College, will present

on " <u>Greek Drinking Beyond the Symposium</u> ." Nadhira's research interests include households, drinking practices, ceramic production, and cultural interaction in 5th and 4th century BCE Greece. She received her B.A. in Classical Studies and Archaeology from Randolph-Macon College in 2016, and then received her Ph.D. in Ancient Mediterranean Art and Archaeology from the University of Michigan in 2023. Since 2014 she has participated in several archaeological projects in Greece, including the Athenian Agora Excavations (2014-2017), the Olynthos Project (2017-present), and the Pella Urban Dynamics Project (2022-present). In addition to her research, Nadhira is an active member of several professional organizations. Currently, she serves as a member of the Archaeological Institute of America's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee; a member of the Classical Association of the Atlantic States' Anti-Racism and Social Justice Committee; and co-chair of the Society of Classical Studies' Graduate Student Committee. She is also the author of the blog Notes from the Apotheke, which aims to provide support to and highlight the work of scholars of color studying the ancient world. This work was awarded the Women's Classical Caucus's Public Scholarship Award for 2021-2022.



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# **IN MEMORIAM:** Jane Harriman Hall, by Linda Montross, presented at the Spring Meeting

Come back with me to 1971. Most of you weren't even born then! I was 24 years old and I had been asked by the Foreign Language Supervisor to give a talk at the Fairfax County Foreign Language inservice. I have no clue what I said, but I do remember my last sentence..."Latin is alive and well at James Madison HS." I also remember two Latin teachers coming up to me afterwards, two teachers who would become mentors, friends, colleagues for all the decades since that year.

Who were they? Christine Sleeper and Jane Hall. We soon were calling ourselves the TRIUMFEMINATE and meeting monthly for dinner at a restaurant just off the Capital Beltway in Northern Virginia. I learned so much about teaching Latin from the two of them but my aged brain only can retrieve one little anecdote, and I know it was from Jane. How do YOU teach the direct object to those restless Latin I students. Jane would slowly move the classroom trash can away from her desk, give it a good kick into the wall, shock her students, lift up the can and show them the years of dents on the can! I KICKED THE CAN! Who did it? I... What was the action?...Kicking ...What received the action? THE CAN!!! I hope Patty Lister remembers that from my classroom in 1983, not that she was a restless Lovely Latin Learner, a term I stole from Jane!

Jane received her B.A. from Mt. Holyoke College in 1952 and her M.A. from the University of Maryland in 1969. She taught all levels of Latin at Fort Hunt HS and for many years was an adjunct professor at the University of Mary Washington. She was Virginia's Foreign Language Teacher of the Year in 1984 and director of the first Governor's Latin Academy in 1988. She was awarded an Ovatio by CAMWS in 1984, the John F. Latimer Award from the Washington Classical Society in 1996, and a Merita Award from the American Classical League in 2001. She was a lifetime member of the Classical Association of Virginia.

In June 1976 Jane approached ACL during the annual Institute being held at Georgetown University about reinstituting a national Latin exam. They concurred and gave her \$1000 to get started. She invited five of her Northern Virginia colleagues to accompany her on this journey: Marty Abbott, Sally Davis, Maureen O'Donnell, Christine Sleeper, and me. She guided and nurtured the exam for 35 years until her retirement in 2011 at the age of 80. From that first exam in 1978 with 7000 participants to this year's 114,000, the exam continues its mission of providing an opportunity for students to receive reinforcement and recognition for their accomplishments in the classroom and to promote the learning and teaching of the Latin language. Jane was the driving force behind our ten year, twenty year, thirty year books as well as all 24 episodes of the Forum Romanum series, now available on You Tube.

Jane's husband of 69 years passed away two years ago. She is survived by her daughter and son-in-law Dianne and Steven Thomas, their daughter and her husband Amanda and Kyle Kaeser, their son Steven, and granddaughter Riley Kaeser.

Jane's hobbies included crossword puzzles, jigsaw puzzles, opera, travelling with students and The Mediterranean Society, swimming, and making beeswax candles to sell at the Historyland Project's annual fundraiser on the Northern Neck.
